## What's New

### NEW FRENCH COURSE

Our Primary French homeschooling course covers the French requirements of the Key Stage 2 English National Curriculum over the course of 4 years.

Primary Level French is a fun, interactive course, which allows our students to not only learn a new language, but also to learn about the French culture. Everyone will normally start on Level 1 in order to ensure that they become confident, well-rounded linguists. If the student can already speak and understand some French, there is the possibility to start with the Level 2 course.

Learning another language gives children a new perspective on the world. It develops a deeper understanding their own cultures and those of others. It extends their knowledge of how language works, and it helps them to develop communication skills, including the key skills of speaking and listening.

## Questioning and Thinking Time

Effective questioning can really help your child think more deeply about their learning. Adults often use closed questions which can be answered with one word. Asking open questions helps us to learn more about our child's thinking and encourages them to think more about their reasoning.

### Open Ended Questions and Prompts

- Tell me about...
- Why do you think..?
- How did you..?
- What happened when..?
- What else can you do with..?
- What would happen if..?
- How might you use..?
- I wonder if..?

Thinking time for children is incredibly important. When we ask a question, we are keen to receive an answer, and silence can seem like our child does not understand or does not know the answer. It is human nature to jump in with a different question or provide the answer when this happens. Try waiting seven seconds or so when you ask a question. This provides time for your child to process what you are asking, think it through, and form a reply. If after this time your child is still unsure, try asking the question again in a different way, or provide a clue to the answer you are looking for.





## Advice from Wolsey Hall parents

This month we would like to share some advice and tips from our Wolsey Hall parents. The feedback was collected during our recent Lower Primary survey, and we would love to share some of the responses with you. We hope to share some more words of encouragement from our parents in future newsletters too.

● Learn to know your child's interests, it really helps, and don't forget to enjoy your homeschool journey!

● Just trust yourself and your children and cherish this time together.

● Expect great things of your children and yourselves. This method of teaching will give your child strong foundations for learning and inspire a love of lifelong learning to come. It may seem hard work at times but the rewards and the learning taking place, are more than worth it.

● I would suggest that parents should not be afraid to change the daily tasks if you want to, as long as the outcome is the same.

● The schedule that works best for us is studying in the morning and again in the evening. We study around 4 hours a day, 6 days a week. I prepare lessons and extra material during the day when the kids play.

● Planning and patience are key!

● Be kind to yourself and to your kids. It might be overwhelming at first but it does get easier with time and you will enjoy it tremendously. When you feel your child is not progressing, take a look back at the first few lessons and you will be amazed. If you or your kids feel overwhelmed, contact your SPM and take a break. Even a few days makes a huge difference.

● An organised study area and pre-week review of the lessons make the week run much smoother. Flexibility toward the schedule, your child, and yourself is key to making it a pleasurable experience for everyone.

● Be prepared to take extra time and find more resources to help your child understand the lesson if they get stuck.

● Approach homeschooling as a unique and special opportunity to learn, explore and grow with your child. Don't try to replicate the hours and rigid timetables of real schools. Life is learning, and everything they do is an opportunity to learn, grow and develop.

# World Book Day winners




To celebrate World Book Day in March we invited students to submit photos of themselves reading a book in an unusual place.
