


Primary Newsletter

MARK AS DONE

You may have noticed a new 'Mark as done' button at the bottom of lesson pages on our Canvas courses. This is a new feature which allows our families to track their journey through our courses. It is an OPTIONAL feature which a family may choose to use. It doesn't affect your visibility of course materials; it is simply a great feature to help you keep track of what you have covered so far.

With courses as your compass, and Wolsey Hall as your guide,


Together, you'll soar, side by side.

The seeds of knowledge and understanding, you will sow.






CHALLENGE OF THE MONTH



FAMOUS HOMESCHOOLER OF THE MONTH

Abraham Lincoln, the 16th President of the United States, was primarily homeschooled by his mother and had limited formal education. Despite his humble beginnings and lack of extensive schooling, Lincoln became one of the most respected and influential leaders in American history. His leadership during the American Civil War and his role in abolishing slavery in the United States are among his most significant achievements.



LIFE SKILLS CORNER

Whether you have your own bedroom or share, every child should know how to clean it! You'll need a few cleaning supplies such as a rubbish bag, a laundry basket, a duster, a small broom and a dustpan so start by gathering these items together. Then let's begin!

Declutter: Pick up any toys, books, or clothes from the floor. Put them away in their proper places. You can use your laundry basket to collect dirty clothes or things that don't belong in your room.

Make Your Bed: Straighten your sheets, fluff your pillows, and make your bed look nice and neat. This is usually the first thing to do because it instantly makes your room look cleaner.

Dust Surfaces: Gently wipe down surfaces with your duster, such as your desk and shelves to get rid of dust and cobwebs. It's like giving your room a little hug! If you have any hard surfaces like tables or dressers, you can use a damp cloth to wipe them clean. Be careful not to use too much water.

Vacuum or Sweep: Use a small broom and dustpan to sweep the floor or you could use a vacuum cleaner. Pay special attention to corners and under your bed where dust might hide.

Empty the Bin: Take your rubbish bag and empty your bin. Tie it up and put it in the main bin in your home.

Organise Your Belongings: Make sure all your toys and belongings have a place to go. Use shelves, drawers or containers to keep things organised. It's much easier to keep your room clean when everything has a home.

Enjoy Your Clean Room: Stand back and admire your hard work. Your room is now ready for you to enjoy!


PARENTS SPOTLIGHT

SUPPORTING YOUR CHILD

Supporting your child with learning at home is a rewarding experience. Here are some top tips to help you provide effective support:

- Create a Dedicated Learning Space: Designate a quiet and organised space for learning. This helps your child focus and associate that area with schoolwork.
- Establish a Routine: Stick to a daily schedule that includes set times for learning, breaks, meals, and play. Consistency helps children feel secure and makes learning more predictable.
- Set Clear Expectations:

 Communicate your expectations for behaviour and learning. Explain what needs to be accomplished and the importance of staying on track.
- Use Visual Aids: Utilise visual schedules, calendars, and to-do lists to help your child understand and plan their tasks. Visual aids can also serve as a reference for what needs to be done.
- Break Tasks into Manageable Chunks: Divide lessons and assignments into smaller, achievable steps. This makes it easier for your child to track their progress.





- Provide Positive Reinforcement:
 Encourage and praise your child's efforts and accomplishments.

 Positive feedback can boost their motivation and self-esteem.
- Adapt to Their Learning Style: Pay attention to how your child learns best. Some kids thrive with visual aids, while others are more auditory or kinaesthetic learners. Tailor your approach accordingly.
- Be Patient and Flexible:
 Understand that learning at home
 may have its challenges. Be patient
 when your child faces difficulties
 and adapt your approach as needed.
- Incorporate Hands-on Activities:
 Learning through play and handson activities can be highly effective.
 Use games, experiments, and
 practical tasks to make learning
 enjoyable.
- Read Together: Make reading a daily habit. Read books suited to your child's age and interests, and discuss the stories, characters, and themes.

SUPPORTING YOUR CHILD CONTINUED

- Limit Screen Time: While technology can be a valuable educational tool, it's essential to set limits on screen time to ensure a healthy balance between learning and leisure.
- Stay Connected: Maintain open communication with your child's Tutors and Student Progress Manager.
- Encourage Critical Thinking: Ask open-ended questions to stimulate your child's thinking. Encourage them to explain their thoughts and reasoning.
- Celebrate Achievements: Celebrate both small and big achievements. Recognise their progress and efforts- this will help to boost their confidence.
- Stay Involved but Avoid Micromanaging: Be present to offer support and guidance, but allow your child some independence in managing their tasks and responsibilities.






- Model a Growth Mindset: Show your child that learning is a lifelong journey. Embrace challenges, make mistakes, and demonstrate resilience as you learn together.
- Encourage Healthy Habits: Ensure your child gets enough sleep, eats nutritious meals, and engages in physical activity to support overall well-being, which is essential for effective learning.
- Seek Additional Support if
 Needed: If your child struggles
 with specific subjects or learning
 challenges, consider seeking help
 from tutors, online resources, or
 educational programs that cater to
 their needs.
