Welcome to the November newsletter! As part of a growing number of homeschoolers around the world, it is a pleasure to have you as part of the Wolsey Hall Oxford family. As champions of homeschooling and all it has to offer, it was heartwarming to see a report overview by MarkInStyle.co.uk which draws statistics from a range of research. It shows:

- Homeschooling is experiencing a steady growth rate of 2% to 8% every year.
- Homeschoolers score 15% to 30% higher on tests than public school students.
- Homeschooling erases racial disparities in academic achievement.
- Homeschooled students perform four grade levels above average.
- Homeschooled children engage in 5.2 activities outside the home.

These highlights are a wonderful validation of the power of homeschooling, and that our families have made an excellent choice in their decision to homeschool their children. We hope that you enjoy reading this month's newsletter.

LIFE SKILLS CORNER

Jigsaw puzzles are for children and adults! While it can seem like a tricky task – especially if it has lots of pieces – if you follow these tips then you will find it much easier to successfully complete:

- Look for the corner and edge pieces first. They're the ones with straight sides. Put them together to make a frame.
- Group similar-looking pieces together. You can make piles for colours, patterns, or shapes. This will help you find the right pieces faster.
- Instead of trying to do the whole puzzle at once, focus on small sections. You can start with the sky, a tree, or a building, for example.
- Look at the picture on the box often to see what it should look like finished.
- Don't worry if a piece doesn't fit right away. Sometimes, you have to try a few to find the one that works.
- Puzzles can be tricky so take your time. If you get stuck or frustrated, take a break and come back to it later.
- If you're really stuck, ask a family member or a friend for some help. They might see something you have missed.
- Make sure you have good light to see the pieces better.
- Keep your puzzle pieces organised and it will be easier to find what you need.
- When you finish a section or find a piece that fits, give yourself a high-five or a little cheer. It's fun to celebrate your success as you go along.

Remember, puzzles are supposed to be fun, so enjoy the process and have a great time putting the pieces together!
