ENGLISH AS A SECOND LANGUAGE (EZL) COURSE COMING SOON

We are pleased to share that work on our new course, English as a Second Language (E2L), is nearly complete. The course will launch in January 2024.

Our E2L course is aimed at students at the Upper Primary level, which is typically students between 7 and 11 years old, who may struggle with a first language English curriculum course with Wolsey Hall. It has been developed for students who are looking for a course more focussed on



English language skills specifically, to help improve their English language before beginning Upper Primary English at Year 3. On completion of our E2L course, students will be ready to transition to our Year 3 first language English course, having put the foundations of language in place.

We are thrilled to offer this bridging course to help our students thrive at Wolsey Hall. This is a full course and represents one academic year of study in a physical school setting. 
Can you work out what this everyday object is? It is zoomed in to make it tricky to figure out.



RESOURCE CORNER

Crazy Gears - available on Apple App Store and GooglePlay

Crazy Gears is a problem-solving game that gets kids thinking critically, problem solving, and exploring physics and other STEM topics. There are no instructions - kids experiment as they figure everything out on their own.



A parents' guide provides background information, definitions, fun facts, and project ideas, though it's not embedded into gameplay. Since there's essentially no instruction, gameplay is accessible to all, no matter what language your child speaks. Parents who don't speak English, however, will not be able to read the handbook.

FAMOUS HOMESCHOOLER OF THE MONTH

As a child, Agatha Christie was homeschooled and wasn't expected to learn how to read until she was eight years old. However, when she was only five years old, Agatha taught herself how to read, several years before it was expected of her. Agatha and her mother were avid storytellers, and Agatha later wrote in her autobiography that her interest in becoming an author started at 11 years old. This is when she first started to put her stories into words and to have them published in the local newspaper. She also lived with learning disabilities, which didn't stop her from becoming a best-selling novelist.



LIFESKILLS CORNER

Always Know Your Left and Your Right!

It is really important that you know your left from your right, as these are some of the most common words used to explain where things are or should be. When you know your left from your right, you can follow instructions more successfully, such as when someone says, "Put the book on the left side of the table." If you find it difficult to remember which is your left and which is your right then here is an easy trick!



- Hold both hands in front of you with the top sides of your hands uppermost.
- Extend your thumbs and index fingers on both hands to form an "L" shape.
- The hand that makes a natural "L" shape is the left hand. The other hand is the right.
