Am I good enough?







Lifeskills corner



Whistling can be a fun skill to master. Here's how you can do it:

- Prepare Your Lips: Start by moistening your lips slightly. This can help in producing a good whistle sound.
- Shape Your Lips: Form your lips into an "O" shape. Keep them relaxed, not too tight or too loose.
- Create a Gap: Place your tongue flat against the bottom of your mouth, just behind your bottom teeth. Leave a small gap between your tongue and the roof of your mouth.
- Blow Air: Take a deep breath and blow air through the small gap between your tongue and the roof of your mouth, while maintaining the "O" shape with your lips.

• Adjustment: You may need to adjust the position of your tongue and the shape of your lips to find the right balance of airflow.

Experiment with different positions until you hear a clear whistle sound.

• **Practice:** Whistling might require some practice, so don't worry if you don't succeed immediately. Keep trying, and soon you'll be able to whistle tunes and impress your friends!

Remember to be patient and enjoy the process of learning. With practice, you'll become a skilled whistler in no time!
